It was wonderful to welcome all students back to the academy in September after the lockdown period. We are so proud of how quickly our students have settled back into their learning and our academy routines. Until very recently, we thankfully experienced minimal disruption to the education of our students through Covid-19. Even in these challenging times, we remain committed to our mission "Ready for University Ready to Lead" and ensuring our students are well cared for in our Silvertown family. We have particularly enjoyed welcoming our Year 7s into the academy. They have quickly settled in and we are proud of all they have achieved in their first term at Oasis Silvertown.

Highlights

- Work is well underway for our permanent build and we receive monthly updates from the oasis
 project team and the building contractor, Morgan Sindall Construction. The building is due to be

- Our Year 11 cohort have the highest attendance at the academy and have been so resilient and committed to their learning. Almost 100% of the year group attended Summer School for a whole week in July, as well as revision classes in October half term. We are proud of how hard they have worked in their recent assessments and look forward to seeing all they will achieve in their final year with us.



- We have appointed student leaders across all year groups at the academy. Our Year 11 Head Prefect speeches and school vote were a real highlight of the term. We have also enjoyed seeing our Student Parliament form and meet together to develop the academy further for its students. If you walk round the academy, you will see our classroom community ambassadors busy in classroom, break and lunch duty. Every student from the moment they enter the academy, is encouraged to lead and it is great to see leadership at Oasis Silvertown continue to go from strength to strength.
- Our academy continues to be a beacon of excellence for music and performance. We were
 delighted for our academy to be featured in the National Oasis Online Training day in
 November. Our students helped to produce and direct a video about the music curriculum at
 Silvertown. This was enjoyed by thousands of employees across the trust. Such is our
 commitment to the arts, despite social distancing and "year group bubbles", our students have
 enjoyed an online music or drama performance by our own students every week in assembly.
- Student Mental Health has never been more important. We held a virtual "Coffee and Catch up with the Principal" session this term focusing on mental health and online safety. This was well attended and Mr Moses, Dean of Students and Mrs Gill, Designated Safeguarding Lead both gave informative presentations and answered questions from parents.

Interview with Donald Fernandes – Hub Council Member



Donald Fernandes – Oasis Academy Silvertown Hub Council Member

Tell us a bit about yourself:

I'm Donald, although some of you may remember me as Mr Fernandes. I am a local resident of Britannia Village and one of the leaders of the local church and, outside of that, I'm a private tutor and a stay-at-home father. I first joined Oasis in its second year as a Learning Support Assistant and then later became a trainee Maths teacher there. Even though I no longer work there, I have remained a good friend to the school, providing whatever help I can offer.

You have been part of the life of the academy for some time before becoming a Hub Councillor. What have been the highlights of the academy's journey?

There are many highlights in Oasis Silvertown's journey, it's hard to whittle it down to a few. The first would have to be the day it opened. I remember as a church we prayed relentlessly for a secondary school to be approved on this side of the dock and it took a while but eventually it came. Another highlight was when we transitioned from Britannia Village to Rymill Street. Within a week we had an Ofsted inspection and they confirmed what I already believed about the school, that it was good leaning towards outstanding. It is also hard to talk about highlights without

mentioning the first cohort's grades, they achieved what they deserved, and the school showed that it could provide a good education. Outside of academic achievements, a personal highlight for me there, was seeing the children engage in the community around them, recognising the bigger world. I remember taking a group of students to the Excel to cook and they were given the opportunity to make and sell burritos at a convention. It was amazing to see how well they communicated with and presented themselves to people they'd never seen before, they managed to sell ALL of their burritos, even the veggie ones!

Why did you decide to become a Hub Councillor, and what do you enjoy most about the role?

Leaving the school wasn't easy as I genuinely love Oasis Silvertown. I always wanted to remain close to the school but also have time to pursue other things which would enable me to meet other members of my community. I was excited to be given the opportunity to join the hub council for the school as it felt like both of my worlds joining together. I think it's very important that we have a school that provides a good academic education and at the same time is engaged in the local community. After all, education is one aspect of a child's life and if we really are going to make a change for the students, we have to look at the other aspects of a child's life, things like healthcare, leisure activities, their home and the wider community.

What makes Oasis Silvertown special?

Hopefully after reading my answers, you can see why Oasis Silvertown is special. It is an answer to prayer, it is a safe place to receive a great education, the school cares for the children beyond the front gate and it's helping to make my community a place for families to stay and call home.



I would advise the younger students to make sure that they revise everything, not just the topics that they find easier. When you get to the exams you realise that everything matters!

Aaliyah: This term I have realised that you are not going to get the grades that you want without making the effort to do so. Don't think of your grades as a failure or a success but rather a stepping stone to your final results. You can never start revision too early!

Drama Department: Taming of the Shrew



English Department National Poetry Competition Winner!



History this Autumn

....has featured students wrestling with different interpretations of history as well as constructing their own.

Year 7 concluded their quest to establish who the man buried near Stonehenge was, using the evidential record from one of Britain's richest Bronze Age burials to establish what the man might have done for a living, where he came from and when he lived; weighing up which of their inferences they thought was the most likely.

Year 8 have delved into competing interpretations of the British Empire to endeavour to understand why

Niall Ferguson sees it as 'essentially a good thing' whereas Sashi Tharoor has described it as an 'era of darkness', exploring each historians background, education and responses to each other.

Year 9 finished their enquiry into the Jarrow Crusade, trying to establish how significant the march based on its impact at the time and how it affected the future, and what it tells us that many people have factually incorrect memories of the march. They are now exploring how a cartoon map of Europe demonstrates why World War I broke out in 1914.

Year 10 have been investigating the changing nature of crime and punishment from the Year 1000 to present day, from Witchcraft in the Early Modern to the introduction of Hate crimes in the 20th century and the various factors influencing both changes and continuity.

Year 11 have been tackling competing interpretations of Weimar & Nazi Germany, challenging the validity of historian's interpretations using their own knowledge of the Period.



Literacy at Oasis Silvertown

At Silvertown we have been excited to continue our mission to foster a love of reading in every young person, despite all the challenges faced. Literacy is arguably the most important factor to a child's success in school, and therefore we are continuing to invest in our school-wide reading initiative - Reading For Pleasure. Twice a week students read a book together as a class, with each year group having books specifically chosen to enhance their learning.

These books are carefully selected to challenge, provoke and inspire. Books act as both mirrors and windows on the world; it provides an opportunity for us to reflect upon our own lives as well as to understand the lives of others. As a community, we've seen how

COVID-19 has placed great strain on children and we sought to raise money for diverse literature.

A big thank you to Morgan Sindall Construction who bought a whole class set of Punching the Air- a powerful novel about a boy who is wrongfully imprisoned by award-winning, bestselling author Ibi Zoboi and prison reform activist Yusef Salaam.

This feature enables students to do as many Maths questions as they like separate from their weekly homework. Students in Year 7 are especially excited about this feature as they are able to see a weekly leaders board in terms of who is leading in their class. This, of course, motivates students to do a lot of practice at home!

Our Year 11s are also working incredibly hard this term and we also changed how we do homework with them. Each student in year 11 is given an exam practice workbook for Maths depending on their tier. Students complete weekly homework practicing questions from their workbook based on the grade level of each question.

We are also excited to tell you that our Maths department is now Maths and Computing as Computing is reintroduced to all students. Students in KS3 are given the opportunity to do an entire term of Computing to develop their basic IT skills as well as expose them to the importance of digital literacy. Computer Science is offered as an option subject at KS4 and we now have over 20 students pursuing this option.

Early next term, we will have our STEM enrichment day where students will be given the opportunity to learn about careers in STEM, do Maths puzzles, and create games through Coding. We can't wait for students to take part in one of these sessions.
